JOE CAMPBELL - PVPA PRESIDENT


Greetings PVPA,

THREE CANDIDATES FROM PARAVOLLEY PANAMERICA SET TO ATTEND INTERNATIONAL REFEREEING COURSE IN PRAGUE

In October 2024, Paravolley PanAmerica (PVPA) is proudly sending three candidates to attend the prestigious Level 3 International Refereeing Course in Prague, Czech Republic. This advanced course is essential for preparing referees to officiate at the highest levels of ParaVolley competitions globally. The selected candidates include representatives from Brazil, the USA, and Canada, marking a significant step towards strengthening the zone's refereeing capabilities.

Currently, PVPA has a total of nine active international referees—three each from Brazil and the USA, two from Canada, and one from Colombia. However, with the increasing demand for qualified referees to cover the growing number of competitions in the region, it is crucial to expand this number. To support this goal, PVPA is working hard to organize another International Refereeing Course in South America in 2025, which will allow more countries in the region to train and certify referees.

The referees attending the Prague course, Rachael A. Rodriguez (USA), Weslane Sampaio (Brazil), and Greg Hawthorn (Canada), have successfully completed the course and are now certified officials with Paravolley PanAm. Their participation is vital in ensuring that PVPA continues to meet the standards required for officiating at international competitions and fostering the development of sitting volleyball across the Americas.

I started my volleyball journey in 2006, becoming a National Referee shortly after. In 2008, I expanded my expertise by earning my Sitting Volleyball Referee certification, participating in various national and international tournaments. My passion for sitting volleyball grew even more after officiating at events like the Brazilian Sitting Volleyball Championship and the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games as line judge. In 2024, I'm excited to advance my career further by attending the World ParaVolley International Referee Course in Prague, where I look forward to contributing even more to the growth of sitting volleyball on a global scale.



I began my volleyball journey in 1990, transitioning to officiating in 2010. After attending the 2016 Invictus Games, I developed a passion for sitting volleyball and pursued USA Volleyball National Referee certification. In 2023, I earned a Sitting Endorsement, and now, I am eager to continue my officiating career by attending the World ParaVolley International Referee Course in Prague.

I started my volleyball career playing in school. After injury, my father who was an official introduced me to this aspect of the game in 2009. I achieved my National certification in 2018. Sitting Volleyball Tournament Hold in Curitiba/Brasil



For the second consecutive year, the city of Curitiba hosts the SESC Paracopa, International Military Sitting Volleyball Tournament, and its third edition has already been confirmed in June 2025.

The organizing entity of the championship is the Department of Military Sports of the Ministry of Defense with the support of SESC/PR and the endorsement of the CBVD (Brazilian Volleyball Confederation for the Disabled). In its second year it had 6 teams, including the Brazilian Military Team, the Colombian Military Team, Estonia, Argentina, AVPL and CMP as guest clubs.

There were 4 days of competition, with a total of 20 games, an exciting final between the Brazilian Military Team and the Colombian Military Team, and for the second consecutive year the home team won the tournament.



The 2nd international military sitting volleyball tournament held in Curtiba is a partnership between the Ministry of Defense and SESC PR, with the support of CBVD, with the aim of promoting the sport in the national and international military sphere. This edition, in 2024, was attended by 4 countries and 2 invited teams who, with a lot of determination, showed the strength of SITTING VOLLEY with extremely technical and competitive games. "Within the national and international military scenario, we believe in the evolution of Military Sitting Volleyball and that it will soon become a military World Championship of the International Council of Military Sports, the CISM. PVPA IN PARIS 2024 PARALYMPIC GAMES

A HISTORIC SHOWING FOR SITTING VOLLEYBALL AT



ARGENTINA SPORT INITIATIONS

Motivated by the Program of Initiation Schools to Sitting Volleyball of Argentina National Sports Secretariat, once again proposes to open the way so that children and young people with physical disabilities from private and public schools throughout the country have the opportunity to know that adapted and Paralympic sports exist and that they can access to different proposals.

For this, Paravoleibol Argentina designed a strategy to detect students with diverse conditions in their locomotor system and began the journey through institutional means so that the Ministry of Education becomes part of it and can distribute the information in an expansive way in order to reach all corners of the country and be able to offer Sitting Volleyball

The Schools for this year functioned with development poles in the South Zone of Gran Buenos Aires - Quilmes; in the North Zone of GBA, and finally in Rosario - capital of the province of Santa Fe. These three places are highly populated cities.

The idea is that each year the EIDEs of sitting volleyball will rotate around the country and that the activity will continue to function autonomously. These young people will surely compete to be able to represent their localities in the National Evita Games and from there some can nourish our grassroots selections as occurred years ago and which resulted in a Silver Medal in the Parapan American Youth Games in Bogotá.

Argentina firmly believes that **mass development** with good planning and sustained over time is responsible for strength in high performance.



SPOTLIGHT

Bill Hamiter: A Journey of a Championship Coach









Bill Hamiter's coaching journey began in the 1980s and has led to unprecedented success in sitting volleyball. His passion for the sport and dedication to athletes with disabilities have made him a champion on and off the court.

I began my career in coaching at an early age. I started working in volleyball in 1980 with a college program. Time was spent coaching in junior club volleyball, college volleyball, and a short stint in High School volleyball. During those early years I was fortunate to have some successful years winning 5 District Championships, 2 Regional Championships, and 2 National Championship births coaching at Southern Nazarene University. Coaching in High School I was able to win 3 State Championships and 2 runner up finishes. These years opened my eyes to the enjoyment of coaching and the impact coaching can have on players' lives.

I spent time coaching in the USA Volleyball National High-Performance Program which led me to be hired as the Head Coach of the USA Men's National Sitting Team in 2001. This was a time of development for the men's team in the US. The team steadily improved to the point where they qualified for the 2004 Athens Paralympic Games at the first ParaPan American Games by winning the Gold Medal.

By this time sitting volleyball had won my heart and I knew I wanted to serve the underserved population of athletes with disabilities for the rest of my coaching career. In 2009 I was hired full-time and added Head Coaching duties for the Women's National Sitting Team as well as Director for the Sitting Program to the Men's Team Head Coaching duties. In 2014 a Men's Head Coach was hired. I continued as Program Director and Head Coach for the women. A robust year-round program was developed to support sustained excellence.

The Women's team made significant strides and had its highest finish ever at the 2010 World Championship, winning a silver medal and then won a silver medal at the London Paralympic Games in 2012. The Women's team continued its winning ways by getting a silver medal at the 2014 World Championships and in 2016 won their first Paralympic Gold Medal at the Rio Paralympic Games. A silver medal was won at the 2018 World Championship followed by winning their second Gold Medal at the Tokyo Paralympics 2020. The Women's team has won Gold medals at all the ParaPan America Zone Championships including 2023 which qualified them for the 2024 Paris Paralympics. It was in Paris that the Women's team accomplished the 3-Peat by winning its third Gold Medal in a row.

I have had the privilege to coach amazing athletes throughout my career and have collaborated with outstanding coaches and staff. God has blessed me by placing me in a position that the Sitting Program and its teams can be successful. I have had the privilege to help other countries, programs, and players throughout my career. I have been an instructor for players and coaches in both the standing discipline and sitting discipline of volleyball around the US and internationally.

SAFEGUARDING:

IT'S EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY

Hey there! Did you know that safeguarding in sports is super important to ensure that athletes can have fun and compete in a safe environment? It involves taking measures to protect athletes from harm, such as preventing abuse, promoting positive behaviors, and providing support when needed.

Creating a safe environment is a big part of safeguarding in sports. This means making sure that coaches, officials, and volunteers who work with athletes are trained and qualified, and that there are rules and procedures in place to keep everyone safe. World ParaVolley prioritizes the safeguarding of all athletes, coaches, technical officials and volunteers involved in participating in its activities. The WPV Board established the Safeguarding Integrity Commission to oversee the implementation of an organisation-wide safeguarding policy and program system. At WPV international tournaments a Safeguarding Officer is identified to facilitate reporting, and help provide additional support and guidance.

At the Zonal competitions, the Asst. Technical Delegate (TD) will serve as the Safeguard Officer.

HOW TO HOST

The image and reputation of the sport of ParaVolley is best characterized by the quality and organizational efficiency of PVPA's tournaments. In order to provide interested host nations with an opportunity to develop the sport, a bidding process has been introduced.

The bidding process is a key first step in determining if an organizer has the capacity and resources to stage an event, thereby helping to eliminate any unnecessary costs. Moreover, the procedure ensures a level of fairness by guaranteeing all interested parties have access to the same level of information – including the rules, regulations and expected standards of the international federation – at the time of bidding.

The procedures are in place to assist any potential organizer to prepare its BID and understand its obligations towards PVPA. In this way PVPA seeks to provide consistency in the way its tournaments are organized and presented, leading to a greater level of success for the organizers.

We would like to create a culture of having our zonal competitions confirmed one year in advance. We know that this would benefit all teams in creating a budget to enhance financial planning.

PVPA INFORMATION REQUIRED

PVPA Nations.

I want to give to you some very important information that is crucial in hosting a Regional, National or International competition. This information should be submitted for both indoor sitting and beach standing volleyball.



In order for PVPA to maintain a current and correct History of events, and for the IPC/APC to track the activities in all 4 zones globally, we need for you to send a post-competition result to the PVPA Sport Director (Cristiana Figueira). As you know, the IPC requires all sports to apply for participation in the Paralympic Games. That time has come for Los Angeles 2028, and the IPC has approved Sitting Volleyball as the only approved volleyball discipline for these Paralympic Games.

It's essential that each country try to develop the sport, and more than that, it is critical that tournaments are documented and submitted to PVPA. With these reports, we can show that our Zone is working hard for the development and growth of our sport.

Hosting an international event is another critical point. I know that isn't easy, but we need to try for the sport's good. PVPA can go through the checklist and handbook together so we can adjust the demands. Don't be afraid to talk to us. We are on the same side, with the same goal.

There can be only one recognised body per nation.

Membership fees are calculated every two years, and paid each year. The membership year is the calendar year (January 1 - December 31).
